What are your relationships revealing?

Matthew 22:36-40 records a conversation between Jesus and a teacher of the Mosaic Law.

³⁶ "Teacher, which command in the law is the most important?"

³⁷ Jesus answered, "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, and all your mind.' ³⁸ This is the first and most important command. ³⁹ And the second command is like the first: 'Love your neighbour as you love yourself.' ⁴⁰ All the law and the writings of the prophets depend on these two commands." (NCV)

As often happens today, Jesus' 'answer' is often taken out of context from he who is speaking it. We remove 'the truth' from the one offering the wisdom and make it 'a truth'. As 'a truth' we can be seemingly applying that wisdom ourselves. As 'a truth' it is ours to understand and something we must do, often expressed as "If I can love others, then I am loveable and then maybe Jesus can love me too? When I can do this, it proves to me that I have surrendered all my heart, soul and mind to God." Only we won't have, because it is all works.

Human efforts to 'love our neighbour' are works that are exposed when the doors are closed and the darkness surrounds us. This revelation is that we are not able to achieve this love in our own strength. If we are able to convince ourselves (or others) that "we can do it", it manifests as control. A human control that fuels abuses of power and breaches of trust that are carried out on the innocent, the vulnerable; our neighbour. The recent conviction of Cardinal George Pell, while in

the public sphere, is not isolated to the Catholic Church nor Christianity within our society. While the nature of this abuse is in the public arena, thanks to the Royal Commission into Institutional Response to Child Abuse, it is by no means the only level of abuse of power and breach of trust, prevalent within churches.

When 'Love of our neighbour' is rejected outright, it manifests as "my rights!" which is an excuse to use and abuse our neighbour without consequence or consideration of the outcome, it's about whatever "I" want. Or worse, it manifests as hatred, bigotry, racism, sexism and substance abuse. The recent slaughter in the Mosques in Christchurch, New Zealand, while shocking and close to home, is by no means the only act of abuse of freedom and terrorism being enacted today.

Just as the Law of Moses was being abused in Jesus' day, Jesus' revelation in Matthew is twisted into something we "can do", "must do" today rather than seeing the deeper truth! That truth is that unless we are in relationship with God, none of the Laws are achievable.

In fact, Jesus' answer in Matthew is a summation of the 10 Commandments into its base components as recorded in Exodus 20:1-17. The first 4 commandments, verses 3-11, are a summation of **Love God**, and the remaining 6 commandments, verses 12-17, are a summation of **Love your neighbour**. Moses received the 10 Commandments from God. Matthew records the condensing of the Law from Jesus.

As 'the truth', we must listen to the one telling it. 'The truth' of this encounter recorded in Matthew is that Jesus is sharing with us the core of his being

as God's Son. A Lordship of lords and Kingship of kings founded in his complete surrender to God his father! He is Saviour to all because he loves us as he is loved - completely, unconditionally and abundantly. This love is not only in his death on the Cross but in his life, ministry and resurrection by the power of the Holy Spirit! As God said at Jesus' baptism in Matthew 3:17 "This is my Son, whom I Love, and I am very pleased with him." Mark 9:7 records it as "this is my Son, whom I love, listen to him!" On the Mount of Transfiguration God's voice out of the cloud said in Matthew 17:5 "this is my Son, whom I love, and I am very pleased with him. Listen to him." and Luke 9:35 records it as "this is my Son, whom I have chosen. Listen to him!". In the Gospel of John 6:40, Jesus said "Those who see the Son and believe in him have eternal life, and I will raise them on the last day. This is what my Father wants."

The deeper truth Jesus is alluding to, is that if you haven't surrendered all you are to God, then you can't love your neighbour, not truly - often because you don't see yourself as worthy in God's presence. Eternal life isn't found in our efforts to love our neighbour. The love is the outpouring of our relationship with Christ Jesus and through him, God.

All the laws of the Hebrew Bible or Old Testament are wrapped up into two seemingly simple statements: 'Surrender all we are to God' which will 'be evident in our treatment of others'.

I can't help thinking, "the more the world turns away from Christ Jesus, the more acts of violence and abuse will escalate!" They shouldn't have happened at all given the revelation of Jesus as Saviour occurred over 2000 years ago. Only relationship with God through Christ Jesus can save us.

We are to be God's solution to a world in pain.

Our testimony as to who Christ Jesus is and his love that he shares is a revelation — good news to be proclaimed.

What do your actions and relationships reveal about your surrender to our Lord and Saviour?

May your continued witness and testimony be empowered by your surrender in and relationship with Christ Jesus our King.



Current research has shown that fathers uniquely bring strengths in over 70 different ways to bringing up children - especially boys.



News from Zimbabwe

BJ Mpofu sent through an email update on the situation there following Cyclone Idai. He writes.

"Dear Friends,

The cyclone that ravaged the eastern parts of our country was unprecedented. Reports from the area, and the TV clips, were pretty frightening. It was like one is watching a movie with everything just seeming impossible; like fiction.

I am reliably told the figures of those who lost their lives is in the hundreds and not in the tens. It is not only people who died but livestock as well. Crops in the fields were destroyed so these people were left with virtually nothing. It's a very unfortunate situation indeed.

Zimbabwe as a whole is facing a terrible drought as the rainfall has been way below average. So the problem has been compounded in these areas and food security is going to be a big challenge.

While the western areas (where we are) are free from the (direct) effects of the cyclone, we anticipate the effects economically are going to be felt soon as most of our fuel comes through Beira in Mozambique which has been badly affected.

We do ask for your prayers as we face an unfortunate future, worse with the political environment as it is, very uncertain. Thank you for thinking of us in these difficult times."
