

"Let us walk in the light of the Lord" Isaiah 2:5

This week's lectionary readings invite us into the Advent season, a time of anticipation grounded in a hope manifested in the divinity of Christ incarnated, resurrected and his promised return.

I am always deeply inspired by the imagery of light breaking into darkness. Light is used through the biblical narrative to describe the hope God brings into the world and a charge to the people of God to embody it in their witness.

In the anticipation of the coming of the Lord, we are reminded of the urgency of his impending arrival (Matt 24: 36-44), but not knowing exactly when that will be. Isaiah prepares God's people with a beautiful image of announcing God's pending reign – division and conflict are

transformed into unity and peace. A new day is coming and it is God who initiates it. The invitation is for God's people to be in perpetual readiness for the coming reign by submitting to instruction from God's word, transforming weapons into tools for cultivating life, turning attention away from war and conflict and towards reconciliation and peace.

The Apostle Paul celebrates the passing away of darkness and the anticipation of a new day now that salvation is nearer to us than when we first became believers (Rom 13:11-14), so dress yourselves in the light.

The light that broke into the darkness through the incarnation of the Word becoming flesh, broke into our human existence in all its vulnerability and frailty. But the darkness did not overcome it. The incarnated Christ was crucified, suffered and died,

but the darkness still did not overcome the light. The light of the Lord in all its glory is revealed in the resurrection of Christ who overcomes sin, darkness and death. The darkness continues to creep in unwelcome and uninvited, but as children of the light who anticipate the coming reign of God's kingdom, the darkness still cannot overcome the light.

Our invitation to walk in the light of the Lord is to



walk in the resurrection hope, both realised and anticipated. We serve a living God who continues to create the church through the power of the Holy Spirit as we walk in the light of the Lord. We're invited to be open to transformation, anticipate the new day God is bringing into existence and live in

such a way that God's reign has already taken place within us.

2020 brings forth a new season for Churches of Christ in SA & NT. There are many things we have to look forward to individually, within our own communities and as a Movement of churches together. As we anticipate these many things, let us anticipate the reign of Christ in our lives and the world in which we live, so we can be ready for what God wants to do in us and through us.

Let us walk in the light of the Lord.

Since gaining independence, South **EFT** Sudan has struggled with war and violence. Parents and children have

been torn apart. Hundreds of thousands have been killed. Half the population suffers hunger, because they don't have the stability to grow food. South Sudan needs a breakthrough.

Garang is one of the Board members of the LAID Foundation of South Sudan (LAFOSS). He grew up in Sudan, during the second Sudanese Civil War. When he was just a boy, his family was forced to flee their home. "We walked night and day in the bush," Garang says, "in the grass and in the thorny places. I got pierced. My soles now are spottish. I don't want this mark to be in soles of others."

This experience is why he is passionate about the LAFOSS Peace Project. By working with community leaders, churches and schools, LAFOSS is helping make breakthroughs in their country through establishing 'Peace Clubs' in local schools. Leaders from each school are trained to resolve differences without violence. They take these skills back to their schools and teach peace building to their classmates. The attitudes of the next generation are changing through these projects. The young people of South Sudan can break through the division of the past.

COCOA partners with projects all around the world to help enable breakthroughs; but breakthrough looks different for everyone!

Breakthrough for a family in Bangladesh is a safe and hygienic sanitation system.

Breakthrough for a Zimbabwean family is a loan to start a small business, so they can take care of an abandoned child.

And breakthrough for South Sudan is building a grassroots movement for peace.

R. Stirling Lecture.

As people will hopefully appreciate, there is a lot of hard work which goes on behind the scenes in order for Convention to happen. For Convention 2019, this began back in December last year when a committee under the authority of State Board, was appointed to oversee arrangements for this year's event. (As I write this, the committee is meeting on the 6th December for a debrief session because we can't sit back on our laurels; we want Convention to be the best it can be.) How important it is to <u>pray</u> for these two bodies as well as for one another in our respective cultural contexts!

Everyone was aware that State Board had been looking for a new State Minister and it was most pleasing to see people's response to the video of Peter Barney, the person from W.A. whose name has been put forward to take on this role. To have Peter come on board is part of the excitement of what God has in store for us as we move forward in faith.

In reflecting upon all that happened during the course of the four days of Convention, I would again express my sincere thanks to Scott Combridge who has done a great job for the past two years as our Executive Officer (interim) as well as the State Office team. I would also say a special "Thank you" to everyone who assisted in some way to make this year's Convention such a special and positive occasion. This year's Convention is one we can celebrate with gratitude and praise to God. As we head into another year with its challenges and opportunities, I am greatly encouraged. As the psalmist says, "... God is the strength of my heart and my portion
